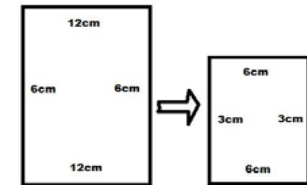




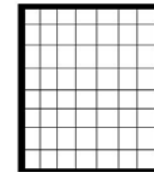
# Supercharge Your Performance With Junior Cert Mindmaps



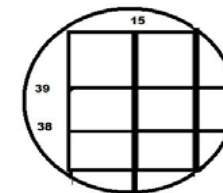
1. Draw map in pencil!!!



2. Make sure that each side of the map you draw measures exactly half of each side of the given map!



3. After the frame is drawn, add in the grid boxes as they appear on the large map



4. Add grid reference numbers to the sides of the map

5. Write a title on top of your ordinance survey map for example 'Map of Wexford'

11. Mark in a key at the side of the map – this is a short summary of the features drawn

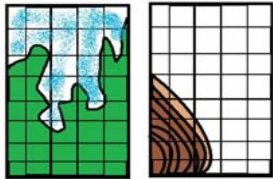
10. Use different coloured pencils to draw in different features – different roads

9. Mark in features asked in the exam paper

For example a post office or primary road

You will find out what their symbols look like by checking with the map's key (at the back)

8. If the map you have to draw has a coastline – draw it in EVEN IF YOU AREN'T ASKED!



No coastline: look for a mountainous area (a brown area with lines), lake, river or town

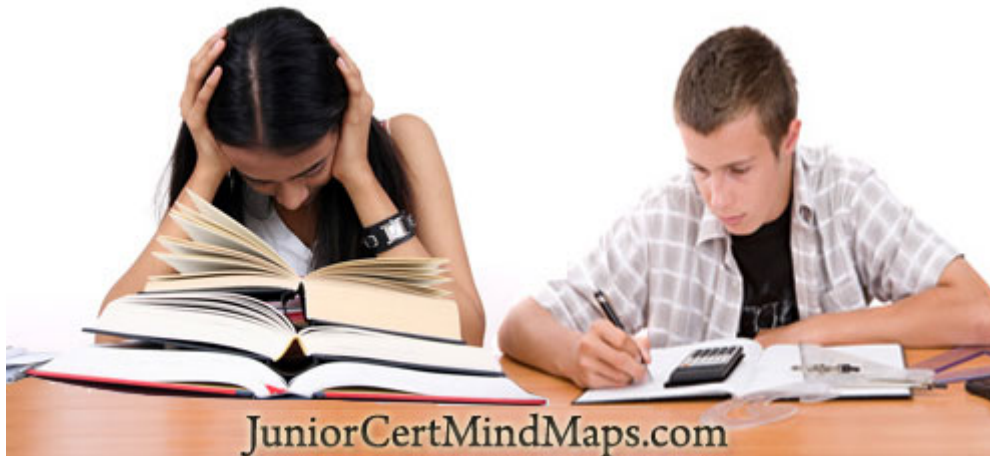
7. Mark in the national grid letter on your map



For example: 'T' or 'C' – there will always be a letter located somewhere on the map.

6. Write in a scale and make sure that it's halved the measurements of the map

For example: 2cm = 100,000km becomes 1cm = 100,000km or 2cm = 200,000km
